# A Lesson for the Church from Valley Forge

Dear Church Family,

One of my favorite things to do when July 4 approaches is to take some time to make a trip out to Valley Forge National Park. If you haven't been there, I highly recommend it. It is an incredible thing for me to think about what those 12,000 soldiers endured during their six-month encampment, between December 1777 and June 1778.

It brings up the interesting question: why was Valley Forge so significant for the eventual outcome of the Revolutionary War? After all, Valley Forge was just one of eight winter encampments for General Washington and his men during the course of the war. Fur-



ther, *no battle* against the British army was ever fought there, and no one particular dramatic event occurred there. The only thing that happened at Valley Forge was a *long, hard winter*, during which 2,000 soldiers died, without a single enemy attack.

What was it about Valley Forge that was *so important*? Well, it was that the *Experience* of that long, hard winter together; the hardships they bore, the training they received, and the things they endured together, molded General Washington's army into a cohesive unit, so that their endurance through the winter of 1777-78 was itself a victory.

What was it that sustained them through that time at Valley Forge, enabling them to endure and not fall into utter despair and come out defeated? It was three things, in particular.

## A Lesson for the Church from Valley Forge


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- 1. Their *Faith* in their great general Washington, who was with them every day.
- 2. The *Hope*, of Freedom that what they were going through was NOT in vain.
- 3. **Bearing** each other's burdens amidst such incredible hardship.

What is the take away for us? I would suggest there is a great lesson here for the church. Dear Church, of course, our battle is not against flesh and blood, but against the principalities and powers in the heavenly places (Ephesians 6:12). While we do not take up arms against any physical foe (indeed, the law of King Jesus is love, and His gospel is peace), we are nevertheless engaged each and every day of our lives in a great spiritual battle which will not cease this side of the New Jerusalem! We are in this

battle *not* merely as isolated individuals, but as those whom the Lord has bound together by His Word and Spirit.

Therefore, like with General Washington's men at Valley Forge, we are enduring the cold, dark winter of this world by



FAITH, and staying with and supporting one another through the things we are called to endure throughout our sojourn here. This is itself a Victory. As we have been seeing in our study of 1 Peter, God is using the things we suffer in this life to purify and refine us, to bring us closer together, so that we might have opportunity to bear witness to the world around us of who we really are as the people of God and what we are all about as Good News People, living in a Bad News World.

And so that we might bear and endure, the Lord has graciously given us three things:

- 1. The *Presence* of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is with us every day Matthew 28:20.
- 2. The Sure *Hope* of the Freedom that is to come Romans 8:18-25
- 3. *Each other*, to bear one another's burdens along the way Hebrews 10:24-25.

Beloved friends, it is for these reasons that we come together week after week. Our regular gatherings are like a winter encampment amidst the battlefield of faith, where we help and support one another, and together hear words of encouragement from our Lord Jesus himself.

Why is this necessary? It is necessary because my Faith is weak. The burdens get unbearable. My Hope fades. As I sojourn through this foreign land, I need the Lord, Yes and I also need YOU. I need you to remind me what it is

Pastors in Presbyterianism hold the same basic office in the church as the other elders, with the one difference being that pastors are those specifically called to the ministry of preaching, teaching, and sacraments (hence pastors are referred to as "Teaching Elder," as distinct from other elders, who have the title, "Ruling Elder").

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
## Division in the Church

# "How Sweet and Awesome Is The Place"

Wikipedia tell us that Isaac Watts (17 July 1674 – 25 November 1748) was an English Congregational minister, hymn writer, theologian, and logician. He was a prolific and popular hymn writer and is credited with some 750 hymns. His works include "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross", "Joy to the World", and "Our God, Our Help in Ages Past". He is recognized as the "Godfather of English Hymnody"; many of his hymns remain in use today and have been translated into numerous languages.

Watts was born in Southampton, Hampshire, England, in 1674 and was brought up in the home of a committed religious nonconformist. His father, also Isaac Watts, had been incarcerated twice for his views. Watts had a classical education at King Edward VI School, Southampton, learning Latin, Greek, and Hebrew.

Watts displayed a propensity for rhyme from an early age. He was once asked why he had his eyes open during prayers, to which he responded:

"A little mouse for want of stairs - ran up a rope to say its prayers."
He received corporal punishment for this and, after his father punished him, he replied:

"O father, father, pity take - And I will no more verses make."

One of Watts' lesser known hymns is "How Sweet and Awesome Is the Place". Take some time to meditate on his words...

How sweet and awesome is the place with Christ within the doors, while everlasting love displays the choicest of her stores.

"While all our hearts and all our songs joint to admire the feast, each of us cries, with thankful tongue, "Lord, why was I a guest?"

"Why was I made to hear Your voice, and enter while there's room, when thousand made a wretched choice, and rather starve than come?" 'Twas the same love that spread the feast that sweetly drew us in; else we had still refused to taste, and perished in our sin.


Pity the nations, O our God, constrain the earth to come; send Your victorious Word abroad, and bring the strangers home.

# Bible School Class on the Nicene Creed

For four weeks in May and June, we had a short class on the history of the Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed (often simply called "Nicene creed"), the first two ecumenical church councils, and a short history of Protestant denominations.



A Creed is a short statement of the most essential doctrines of the Christian faith drawn from the Bible. It never takes the place of the Bible, but is useful in teaching seekers and children, and in uniting the church in its understanding of the message of Scripture. It reflects many conflicts that the church fathers hammered out in the first few ecumenical "worldwide" church councils. Issues that had to be clearly worded were the true nature of lesus (an equal person of the Trinity, distinct from the

worded were the true nature of Jesus (an equal person of the Trinity, distinct from the Father and Spirit, but of one substance and being with them), His saving work, the person and work of the Holy Spirit, the importance of baptism, and the confidence in the resurrection and eternal life. The Creed doesn't answer every possible question nor does it seek to. Some examples of questions the Creed does not try to answer are: How can you understand that Jesus was "begotten" of the Father, but did not have a beginning? Does baptism actually forgive sins, or is it a symbol that signifies our standing with God? Why do we say "catholic" church? You don't have to be ready with answers to every possible question as you share the gospel with your neighbors, but a clear outline of the basic historic Christian faith is critical.

On the last Sunday in response to some questions, a diagram of the history of protestant churches (shown on page 7) was given out.

# The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.




And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God, begotten of His Father before all worlds, God of God, Light of Light, very God of very God, begotten, not made, being of one substance with the Father; by Whom all things were made; Who for us and for our salvation came down from heaven; and was incarnate by the Holy Spirit of the virgin Mary, and was made man; and was crucified also for us under Pontius Pilate; He suffered and was buried; and the third day He rose again according to the Scriptures, and ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father; and He shall come again, with glory, to judge both the living and the dead; Whose kingdom shall have no end. And we believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord and giver of Life, Who proceeds from the Father and the Son; Who with the Father and the Son together is worshiped and glorified; Who spoke by the prophets; and we believe in one holy catholic and apostolic church; we acknowledge one baptism for the remission of sins; and we look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.


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# What Is the Session and What Do We Do?

Elders have the calling to oversee the ministry of the church and to shepherd the flock as we follow Jesus together. (1 Peter 5:1-4). We do this informally day by day and week by week as we talk with and pray for the church and her members, and talk and pray with and for one another. When important matters need to be decided, we make those decisions in our regular Session meetings, when the whole Session officially gathers as a body. These meetings are ordinarily held on the second Thursday of each month, from 7:00-9:00 pm.

When the Session of the church meets, our time is spent encouraging one another, discussing important



matters related to the well-being of the congregation – both individual members and the church as a whole – and making decisions on those matters that are before us at that time. We soak all these matters in prayer together before the Lord.

Currently, as part of our encouragement and ongoing training, we are reading together a book called "The Elder and

His Work," written by a man who

was a long-term Presbyterian elder in 19<sup>th</sup> century Scotland, David Dickson. We begin every meeting by reading and discussing a section from this book, and then prayer based on what we discussed. After this is done, we discuss any communications we might have from the congregation, and then have a season of prayer for known needs of the members and families of Restoration church. The discussion and prayer portion of our meetings generally takes the first hour.

After this, we go into the "business" of the church, which takes up the second hour of our meetings (sometimes more). "Business" is just shorthand for any decisions that affect the life of the whole church. In this portion of our meetings, we spend our time deliberating on and making decisions on important matters before us affecting the whole of the congregation and our ministries – things like hiring a director of music, renovating the downstairs, setting up a committee for outreach, reviewing the church finances, etc. In order to make things run as efficiently as possible, we try to communicate between meetings via email, so that we are already coming with an awareness of what we will discuss.

Thank you, dear church, for how supportive you are of the ministry of Restoration! We, as your elders, do always give thanks to our God for you in our prayers. Please do continue to pray for us as well. It is a great privilege and blessing as well as a great responsibility to serve as your elders. We know deeply our own insufficiency for these things, but we rest our trust solely on the all-surpassing sufficiency of our Good Shepherd, who is with us always as we follow Him!




